### Congratulations ROTC Class of 2020 - Virtually of Course!

Despite COVID-19 restrictions and limitations, literally shutting down University and High School campuses throughout the region, HRCMOAA continued to support the myriad of Spring award presentations and commissioning ceremonies that normally occur this time of

year. Assistant Director of Community Affairs and Board of Director CAPT Mike "Breeze" Barea, USN (Ret) personally visited respective University ROTC administration offices at Norfolk State University (NSU) and Old Dominion University (ODU) to hand deliver Spring Awards and Commission Ceremony Gold Bars and Congratulatory Letters that would be presented later on during virtual commission ceremonies.

On Thursday May 7, 2020 the first in a series of virtual commission ceremonies was initiated by the Hampton Roads Naval ROTC Unit headquartered at Old Dominion University (ODU). The virtual commission ceremony was broadcasted via ZOOM and YouTube for further review. The Hampton Roads NROTC Unit, commanded by Captain Michael C. Bratley, USN is a consortium comprised of four universities; Old Dominion University (ODU), Norfolk State University (NSU), Regent University (RU) and Hampton University (HU). The Naval Service ROTC Unit commissioned 19 Ensigns in the Navy and 5 Second Lieutenants in the United States Marine Corps. The Norfolk State University Army ROTC Spartan Battalion conducted their commission ceremony over a three day period. The Spartan Battalion is commanded by LTC Lisa M. 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
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### Community Affairs - Hampton Roads Chapter ROTC Scholarship Fund

This past year, several of your HRCMOAA board members met with Ms. Andrea Rand, the director of the MOAA Scholarship program to request some changes to how scholarships in our chapter name were being awarded. As a result of our suggestions and input, the MOAA Scholarship Fund Board has agreed to make several important changes. Beginning with the 2020-2021 school year, the MOAA Scholarship Fund Board will give preference in awarding scholarships and grants to children with HRCMOAA chapter member parents. While not guaranteed to go to the child of a chapter member, those children applying for MOAA scholarships with a parent who is a chapter member will receive favorable consideration and the review board will give preference in awarding scholarships to those children. Regardless of whether the student's parent is a chapter member or not, students selected for MOAA scholarships in the chapter name will always be from the area represented by our Hampton Roads Chapter. Below is the status of our chapter scholarship fund both for this year and overall for the 5-year goal.

### LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS UPDATE

CDR Linc Smith, USNR (Ret.), Chair HRCMOAA Legislative Affairs Committee

Amidst the nationwide COVID 19 crisis, our chapter legislative affairs activity has remained steady. For Spring 2020, we have maintained close contact with our Virginia Delegation. This noted, there has been one significant difference in the nature of the contact: due to the Coronavirus pandemic, legislative affairs is being done virtually, versus in person.

This update focuses on three legislative events. First, a Zoom Conference conducted with Congresswoman Elaine Luria (VA 02) in April. Second, telephone conference with the office of Congressman Rob Wittman (VA 01), in advocacy for the halt of military medical cuts. Finally, our MOAA National Storming event, which has been underway since 1 May.

### **ZOOM Conference with Congresswoman Elaine Luria (VA 02)**



On 29 April, I joined Congresswoman Elaine Luria (VA 02) and fellow Hampton Roads Service Organizations in a Zoom Conference. The focus of the Zoom conference was to advocate support for H.R. 6573, purpose of which is, "to amend title 10, United States Code, to authorize the Secretary of Defense to temporarily waive cost-sharing amounts under the TRICARE pharmacy benefits program during certain declared emergencies."

Introduced by Congresswoman Lisa Blunt Rochester (D-DE-At Large), the bill may be viewed at: <u>H.R. 6573 Help Our Heroes Medicine Act of 2020</u>. Media present at the Zoom Conference included Defense trade press and WTKR-TV, News Channel 3, military reporter Mike Gooding.

### **Telecons with office of Congressman Rob Wittman (VA 01)**

In April, I conducted telecons with the office of Congressman Rob Wittman (VA 01), in order to advocate for the halt to reduction of military medical capacity. As posted on the MOAA Homepage, "MOAA continued its work on the Hill to stop cuts to military medical capacity with an April 3 letter to House and Senate Armed Services Committee leadership. The letter urges a provision in the FY 2021 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) to stop medical billet reductions and end the downsizing of military treatment facilities (MTFs)."

### **MOAA National Storming 2020, May and June 2020**

Due to the COVID 19 crisis, the annual MOAA National Storming in DC, previously scheduled for 25 March, was cancelled. Instead, a virtual national MOAA storming is now underway, continuing the remainder of April and into June.

To the MOAA website: "While the ongoing pandemic forced the cancellation of in-person events connected to Storming the Hill 2020, MOAA will continue its advocacy mission with a Virtual Storm highlighting the need to protect the military health care benefit earned by millions of service members, past and present." In spite of the temporary cancellation of our luncheons and other in-person activities, we are continuing our scholarship fund drive this year. 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## Military ID Card Notification Program

This voluntary program is designed to help Chapter members and their dependent's to renew their ID cards in a timely fashion. Once you and your dependents are enrolled, you will be notified of your impending ID card expiration date in sufficient time for renewal prior to the expiration date.

To enroll by mail: make copies of the form below for each dependent and fill out the required information. Mail to Military ID Card Notification Program, HRCMOAA, PO Box 4612, Virginia Beach, VA 23454-0612.

To enroll by email: visit our website, www.hrcmoaa.org and click on About Our Chapter and the ID Card Notification Program link and follow the instructions.

Note: Over age 75 members, who are eligible uniform family members and survivors of deceased personnel are now eligible for Permanent Identification Cards. Apply within 90 days of expiration of current ID card.

Note on your check that it is for the Hampton Roads Chapter ROTC Scholarship Fund. MOAA will continue to send receipts.

A **third** way is to contribute directly from bequests, wills, trusts, or IRA's. The fund tax identification number is 54-1659039. By contributing from the Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) of a qualified IRA, the taxable IRA income can be reduced by the amount of the contribution. The contribution check must be marked as a charitable contribution. With the change in the tax laws last year, some of our members have found this method to be beneficial. For additional detail, it would be best to contact your IRA fund manager for specifics relating to your IRA.



# Naval Medical Center Portsmouth COVID-19 Pharmacy Changes

To maximize the safety of our patients and reduce crowding in the pharmacy lobbies, NMCP is enacting the following changes to pharmacy services.

**EFFECTIVE APRIL 27, 2020** 

NMCP and the Branch Health Clinic pharmacies will no longer fill any <u>NEW HARD COPY</u> <u>CIVILIAN</u> prescriptions, with the exception of controlled substances.

Controlled substance prescriptions can be dropped off at Oceana, Norfolk, Boone or NMCP.

Non-controlled prescriptions need to be sent to a military pharmacy electronically or filled at a retail network pharmacy of your choice that accepts TRICARE.

### \*\*REMINDER FOR ALL OTHER MEDICATIONS - PLEASE FOLLOW THESE STEPS\*\*

- 1. All medications must be sent electronically by your provider to the pharmacy.
- 2. If your prescriptions are sent electronically by your provider, you can IMMEDIATELY initiate your prescription by calling the **NMCP Pharmacy Call Center** at **757-953-0258**.
- 3. A pick up date and time will be assigned to pick up your prescription at one of the following locations (please allow for a <u>two</u> business day turnaround time):
  - Oceana Pharmacy Drive Thru (M-F 0700-1600)
  - Norfolk Walk-In Pharmacy (M-F 0700-1600)
  - Boone Pharmacy Drive Thru (M-Sat 0730-1700)
  - Scott Center Annex Pharmacy Drive Thru (M-Sat 0700-1800 & Sun 0730-1600)

Due to the high volume of calls, you may experience long wait times.

\*\* Prescription refills must still be called in through AudioCARE at 757-953-6337 \*\*

The NMCP Pharmacy Call Center is open Monday - Saturday from 0730-1900. For more information call 757-953-0258 or ask any of our staff members.



The U.S. Military Academy at West Point held its graduation and commissioning ceremony for the Class of 2020 on The Plain in West Point, New York, June 13, 2020. This year, 1,113 cadets graduated. Among them were 12 international cadets. The class includes 229 women, 132 African-Americans, 103 Asian/Pacific Islanders, 102 Hispanics and 10 Native Americans. There are 143 members who attended the U.S. Military Academy Preparatory School (125 men and 18 women). There are 59 class members who are prior service, eight of those are combat veterans. In attendance were commencement speaker President Donald J. Trump, Secretary of the Army Ryan D. McCarthy and Chief of Staff of the Army Gen. James C. McConville.

### 78th Anniversary of the Battle of Midway

### Observing the 78th Anniversary of the Battle of Midway

"The Battle of Midway is an enduring reminder of American resiliency and resourcefulness."

The Battle of Midway, June 4-7, 1942, is often considered the U.S. Navy's most decisive naval battle, yet the opposing fleets never actually met on the water. It was fought almost entirely with aircraft, launched from both carriers and by land, in a combat environment that tested the courage and willpower of the naval aviators of both sides. It was a struggle in which a numerically inferior U.S. Navy beat back a massive Japanese attack with air power and, most critically, intelligence. We take great pride in honoring this victory.

### The Japanese Strategy

America's Midway Islands were home to U.S. submarine and seaplane bases, and served as a forward staging point for American bombers. While the islands were not of great military value, Japanese Combined Fleet Commander Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto sought to use them to lure American naval forces into a trap and cripple U.S. Pacific power. Occupying Midway would also extend Japan's defensive perimeter and position them for further attacks in the Pacific, and a possible invasion of Hawaii.

Yamamoto's plan was to attack Midway and draw U.S. carriers into the battle, where they would be surprised and outgunned by Yamamoto's huge fleet of carriers, aircraft, and warships. He believed his superior force and the element of surprise would deal a fatal blow to the U.S. Pacific Fleet. What he did not know was that U.S. Naval Intelligence had already discovered his plans.

### The Intelligence Breakthrough

Weeks before the battle, naval radio operators began detecting communications Yamamoto had dispatched to prepare his forces. U.S. signals intelligence analysts led by Commander Joseph Rochefort and Pacific Fleet Intelligence Officer Lt. Commander Edwin Layton also had exceptional knowledge and understanding of the Japanese language and culture. By May 16, American codebreakers at Station Hypo in Hawaii were in possession of much of Yamamoto's plans: the date, time, and location of the attack; the strategic order of battle; and the locations of Japanese ships. Armed with this stunning intelligence, U.S. Pacific Fleet

Commander Admiral Chester Nimitz had all the information he needed to turn the tables on Yamamoto and let the element of surprise work for *him*.

Navy cryptanalyst Joseph Rochefort helped break the Japanese Flag Officers Code, providing a decisive advantage to American forces.

The intelligence showed that the Japanese would lead their assault with the First Carrier Striking Force, commanded by Vice Admiral Chuichi Nagumo. Nagumo had led the attack on Pearl Harbor just six months before and was now steaming toward Midway with a fleet that included four aircraft carriers, two battleships, three cruisers, and 11 destroyers.

To counter this, Nimitz placed his own carriers – the *USS Enterprise*, *Hornet*, and *Yorktown*, which had been damaged a month earlier during the battle of the Coral Sea – on Nagumo's flank, northeast of Midway. As Nagumo sped to Midway, Nimitz's carriers lay in wait.

### **Battle in the Skies**

Yamamoto began his attack in the early morning of June 4, 1942, sending 108 dive bombers, torpedo bombers, and fighter escorts of 36 planes each to

raid Midway. American scout planes had found the Japanese early that morning. Planes were launched from Midway itself to meet the Japanese ships. Among the aircraft, nine B-17s took off for the first air attack from Midway finding Rear Admiral Raizo Tanaka's transport group. Initial strikes did not go well. Under heavy anti-aircraft fire, their crews reported hitting four ships, but no significant damage was inflicted. However, the American forces were decisively repelled by Nagumo's own planes and withering fire from his ships. Nagumo then ordered his planes to land, refuel, and rearm for a counterattack. But this, too, Nimitz had considered

At approximately 10am Pacific time, the Japanese planes prepared their counterattack. Nimitz's Rear Admirals Raymond Spruance and Frank Fletcher were already ahead of them. Dive bombers from the

*Yorktown* and *Enterprise*, dove in undetected from 15,000 feet. In a matter of seconds, they dealt lethal blows to three of Nagumo's carriers, leaving them listing and aflame, and soon knocked out the fourth.

Among the brave pilots was LTj.g. Jack "Dusty" Kleiss from the USS Enterprise's elite Scouting Squadron Six. Kleiss took his SBD Dauntless into a near-vertical dive amid blistering anti-aircraft fire and released three bombs which fatally struck the deck of the Japanese carrier Kaga. Later that day, he also struck the carrier Hiryu and two days later contributed to the destruction of the cruiser Mikuma. Kleiss was the only pilot from either side to land hits on three different ships, which crippled the once-fearsome Japanese fleet. I received an author's signed copy of Dusty's book Never Call Me A Hero.

Another brave pilot was Lt.jg (later RADM) Paul Holmberg, part of a carrier-based Bombing Squadron THREE (VB-3), SBD-3 scout bomber attached to the USS *Yorktown*. Holmberg scored a direct hit on the Japanese carrier *Akagi*, one of the carriers which launched the infamous attack on Pearl Harbor six months previously. After attacking the Japanese aircraft carrier *Soryu*, Holmberg and others were unable to land on *Yorktown* after she was hit and temporarily stopped by Japanese dive bombers. Nearly out of fuel, he ditched successfully near the USS *Astoria*. I had the privilege of meeting him while I served as aide and administrative assistant to the Vice Chief of the Naval Material Command in 1969.

By the morning of June 5th, the battle was effectively over. While small strikes occurred over the next few days, in the end the Japanese suffered a crushing defeat, one heavy cruiser sunk and another wrecked, losing

all four carriers, 322 aircraft, and over 5,000 sailors. On the American side, 147 aircraft, the *Yorktown*, a destroyer, and more than 300 seamen were lost. There was also extensive damage to installations at Midway, moderate damage to installations at Dutch Harbor, and Attu and Kiska islands were lost. The Japanese Navy never recovered, and the tide of war in the Pacific was turned.

In a June 6<sup>th</sup> communiqué, Nimitz magnanimously noted: "Through the skill and devotion to duty of their armed forces of all branches in the Midway area our citizens can now rejoice that a momentous victory is in the making."

On the 77th anniversary of the Battle of Midway, let us all celebrate our U.S. Navy and all those who served victoriously in this battle.
