Phatever he is called, boys and girls throughout the world recognize him as a kindly symbol of Christmas. Here in the United States we know that the jolly, roly poly Santa, in his fur-trimmed suit arrives on Christmas Eve with his sleigh and eight tiny reindeer. And traditionally, American children know that Santa Claus can carry a huge pack of toys down even the smallest of chimneys.


WATER AND SEVER SERVICE

The following Public Notice was issued by the City of Virginia Beach on 21 November 1977. This Public Notice is quoted for your information.

"On the lith day of November, 1977, the Council of the City of Virginia Beach, Virginia, adopted two resolutions entitled "Resolution Authorizing the Issuance of \$3,000,000 Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds (P A Corp.) of the City of Virginia Beach Virginia, and Providing for the Form, Details and Payment Thereof" and "Resolution Authorizing the Issuance of \$5,100,000 Water and Sewer Revenue Notes (P A Corp.) of the City of Virginia Beach, Virginia, and Providing for the Form and Details and Payment Thereof."

The bonds and the notes are being issued to finance the cost of acquiring the sewer systems of Princess Ann Utilities Corporation and Aragona Utilities Corporation and the water and sewer system of Pembroke Utilities, Inc.

The bonds will be in the aggregate principal amount of 33,000,000 and the
