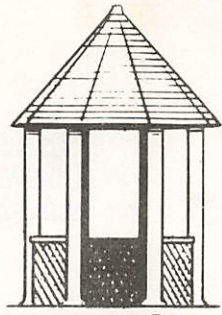

PRESIDENTS CORNER

During the past couple of weeks a few neighbors have expressed concern about animals running loose in the neighborhood and barking dogs. At times (usually the most inappropriate) the late night and early morning air is filled with the off key notes of a canine chorus heralding the arrival of a paper boy or the ominous movement of a leaf in the breeze.

At other times, usually when mowing the lawn or weeding the flower bed a "gift" is discovered, usually left by a dog or cat who has been let out to run by a neighbor who has no respect for others. In both cases there is something you can do!

Virginia Beach has a leash law for animals. The dog (and cat) catcher will gladly come to help you stop your problems. (If you have ever seen the white pick-up truck with the screened in truck bed that cruises the Meadows and Shores you know what I'm talking about.) Traps for cats, which trap them without injury, can also be borrowed from the city pound.

As for noise, you have a right to your peace and quiet. Quieting a barking dog may require a warrant, but the police will help you file it.

In all cases I recommend you talk to your neighbors in an attempt to iron out your problems on a friendly basis. You'd be surprised, some people just don't realize their pets are a problem

However, in all cases remember, you have a right to protect your property and yourself from intrusions by pets who are owned by inconsiderate neighbors. The pets are not the ones at fault - the people who own them are.

JULY RECREATION CENTER REPORT

POOL OPERATION: By the time this issue reaches your home our swimming season will be half over. Virginia Beach has been blessed with almost ideal weather for water programs this year. The perfect weather coupled with the fact that the Center's membership is approximately 220 has made it possible to maintain a full operating schedule. Barring unforeseen breakdowns and/or repairs your Rec Committee anticipates a continued 12 hour a day operation until Labor Day. A major concern during full operation is cleanliness of pool deck/grounds and pool itself. The membership can help in both of these areas by personal attention. Put your trash in the containers provided and insist that your offsprings follow your example. When you have a private party try to leave "your" pool cleaner than when you came. The water filtering system can only handle so much debris. Continued heavy usage may require that the pool be closed for an entire day in order that it may be thoroughly cleaned.

SWIM TEAM: The Marlins have come together again for a season of fun and competition. Practice started June 18, running from 9-11 a.m. on Monday thru Friday. After only two weeks of practice our first meet was held June 30th against Green Run. We won by over 100 points. The second meet was against Oceana on July 7th. The meet was very exciting with the Marlins leading by a few points, however, in the end Oceana had won by eight points! We still have three more duomeets and a championship and Allstar meet. If you are interested in joining the team or helping with the meets please come and inquire at the pool.

SWIM LESSONS: The response and reception of the full range of lessons offered by the Center has been overwhelming. Few, if any, slots are open in remaining sessions this season. Lessons have been offered for an hour each day this year. The demand clearly indicates that next season two hours of swim instruction per day will have to be scheduled in order to meet the requirements of our members.

JOGGERS ON THE STREET

Day or night, summer or winter, theres probably a Pembroke Meadows/Shores citizen on the run. Whether for just plain exercise or doctor prescribed health reasons one of our neighbors is almost always pounding the pavement.

What they don't know is how vulnerable they are! At the most, they weigh upwards of 250 pounds each, not much of a match for a 3,000 lb automobile. Or, for that matter, a 250 lb moped. When metal meets muscle the vehicle is usually the one that doesn't go to the hospital.

Keep an eye out for your neighbors. While prudence would dictate jogging on sidewalks and stopping and looking at all corners, we all know that the quest for physical fitness often overshadows this logic. Drive the legal speed limit of 25 miles per hour and give yourself the chance of saving your fenders for another day.

The Automobile Association of America reported that over 8,700 pedestrians were killed in 1977 alone. Another 108,000 were seriously injured.

You also might give your jogging neighbor a "healthy" piece of advice: always carry some form of identification giving, name, address, phone number and a brief medical history. The doctors in the Emergency Room at Bayside Hospital are damn good, but, they can't perform without basic information.
