INDEPENDENCE BLVD. WIDENING, PHASE IV

The planned widening of Independence Blvd. (phase IV A) from Jeanne St. north to Pembroke Blvd is still on track, although additional delays have been encountered. The City is still negotiating the purchase of some commercial properties along the right-of-way and expects to advertise next month for the construction project. Possible construction could commence at the south end (Jeanne Street) as early as May or June.

We are pleased to report that the proposed addition of a right-turn lane on Pembroke Blvd. at Independence Blvd., has been approved and is in the plans. This third exit lane from our neighborhood (at the Crown Gas station corner) along with a crosswalk across Independence Blvd., was specifically requested by our Civic League (with the concurrence of Pembroke Meadows Merchants Association.) This right-turn lane should significantly reduce the delays which we often

The Army Corps of Engineers and the VA Dept. of Environmental Quality have issued a Joint Public Notice requesting comments concerning the Lake Pembroke overpass portion of the Independence Blvd. widening project. Our Civic League, with concurrence of Pembroke Manor Civic League, has requested a public hearing be held to discuss this matter. Further discussion of the Independence Blvd. widening will be held at the next Civic League meeting, including the plans for five retention ponds which will be constructed alongside the expanded boulevard (to control and filter storm water entering the Lake.)

WHAT ELSE DOES THE CIVIC LEAGUE OFFER?

Pets are important family members. Without the Civic League members who actively organize Pet Lost and Found services, some area households would lose their loved ones. Animal Services patrols our community, too! The following suggestions are offered in the event your furry friend disappears:

*license your dog or cat, which is a city ordinance requirement.

*call the lost and found numbers listed on the entrance bulletin board and on page 4 of this newsletter. (a service provided through the courtesy of your neighbors!)

*notify your surrounding neighbors.

*be aware some residents utilize cat traps, rented from the city, and refer captures to the Animal Control Board. *distribute flyers with specific description of the animal, area lost; list a contact name with telephone number. Consider a published notice in the area newspaper.

*offer a reward for return.

*request to be notified if your pet is found dead.

*VISIT the animal pound off Seaboard Road once a week.

*find out if other informational services are available in your community; students at bus stops, Civic League meetings, newsletter service, postal service employees, newspaper distributors;

DID YOU KNOW?

Mothers of children with ADD are more likely to experience depression that mothers of non-ADD children.

> A DEPRESSION CHECKLIST: WHEN SHOULD YOU SEE A DOCTOR?

There are a number of signs that are characteristic of depression. The American Psychiatric Association recommends that you see your doctor if you experience four or more of the following symptoms constantly for more than two weeks:

*A noticeable change in appetite, accompanied by a significant loss or gain in weight.

*A noticeable change in sleeping patterns, ranging from sleeping too much to an inability to sleep.

*Loss of interest in activities you once enjoyed.

*Fatigue and loss of memory.

*Feelings of worthlessness.

"Inability to concentrate or think.

*Recurring thoughts of death or suicide.

*Overwhelming feelings of sadness and grief, accompanied by awakening tow or more hours earlier than usual in the morning, feeling more depressed, and moving significantly more slowly.

*Physical symptoms, such as headaches or stomachaches.




