LAKE MEADOWS

DAM/PATHWAY. The previously reported improvements planned for our Lake Meadows dam and pathway are still on hold awaiting completion of the heavy work on the new construction house on the easement lot. As soon as the house is completed, the work on the dam will begin.

PLEASE DON'T FEED THE GEESE OR DUCKS! The over-

population of geese and ducks on our community's lakes are causing harm to our lakes and some threats to our health. The droppings of these geese and ducks—particularly the large gaggles of Canada Geese on Lake Pembroke—are contaminating our shallow waters with an overabundance of nutrients. These nutrients cause "blooms" of algae, which in turn consume oxygen from the water endangering the fish and other lake inhabitants, which are essential to the lakes' ecology (bug control, etc.). Also the fowl droppings spread fecal coliform bacteria, on land as well as in the water, which can make humans and other animals sick. Additionally, bread and other foods which the geese/ducks miss

can generate very dangerous botulism toxins when it decays on the muddy lake bottoms.

Another consideration concerning the large number of Canada Geese, which are normally migratory birds, is that regular feedings by humans are turning them into permanent "residents" who won't migrate. If we experience a very severe winter, those geese will probably not survive!

So, please help us protect our environment, our wildlife and ourselves by not feeding the geese and ducks! (An occasional limited feeding of ducklings might be excepted.)


