

BE WARY OF DOGS! At 6:45 a.m. on Friday, March 17, a neighbor went outside to retrieve his newspaper and heard several dogs barking. Upon investigation, he saw a man standing inside a fence at the corner of St. Martin Drive and Pembroke Boulevard and two large dogs (a pit bull and a rottweiler) were leaping at the fence trying to get to him. Animal Control was called and meanwhile, the dogs were barking, jumping up on the fence and occasionally they would tire and sit or lie down by the fence. Fortunately, the man had the presence of mind to leap the fence when the dogs charged him. He also kept their attention so that they would not run off and possibly attack someone else. Animal Control had been called earlier that morning to two other locations—Hudgins Drive and Cheswick Lane—with complaints against the same

The dogs were very vicious and threatened the Animal Control officers and the police officers that responded. The owners of the dogs were located and were able to get them into the animal control truck.

Another day, another incident, different rottweiller. A neighbor was walking her dog on St. Martin Drive when a rottweiler ran from behind the house and attacked her dog that was on a leash. Luckily, the dog's owners were at home and came out and retrieved the dog before it injured the dog on the leash.

The moral of these incidents is to be very careful when out walking--especially if you have children or animals with you. It is also important for owners of large dogs to provide proper enclosures so that people walking down the street don't have to be concerned about being attacked.

P.S. A court hearing was held on April 4 concerning the incident with the pit bull and the rottweiler. It was decided that the dogs would be destroyed and the owners were fined \$150. The owners may appeal the case.

(Cont. from Page 3) detrimental pollution from various sources such as excrement of excessive numbers of geese, ducks and other animals; grass, shrub, or tree clippings and leaves which are dumped into the water or flow in from the streets and gutters; and excessive lawn fertilizers, herbicides and pesticides which can run off or leach through our lawns into the gutters and waterways.

All of these various pollutants can add harmful, even dangerous bacteria, algae and/or eutrophic/decaying matter which can cause sickness in our children, fish kills, proliferation of mosquitoes and other insects and eventually transform our beautiful waterways into swamps.

The required open bidding process to select a contractor for the widening from Pembroke Blvd. to and beyond Haygood Road is nearing completion. The City has recommended a contractor to the State and the Commonwealth Transportation Board who will make the decision since the State pays for more than 90% of the costs. State Senator Ed Schrock has been asked to spur the CTB to get the work started soon, perhaps by June.

NOTICE TO BOATERS. An underwater pipeline has been placed in the Western Branch of the Lynnhaven River and its tributaries from Hebron Cove to Virginia Beach Blvd., which is being used in conjunction with the dredging project on the Lynnhaven River, Hebron Cove, Buchanan Creek and other areas along the river. Mariners are cautioned to remain a safe distance away from the pipeline, boosters, barges, anchors and other equipment in the river.

The underline pipeline is marked approximately every 400 feet by small orange buoys and flashing amber lights at night. Boaters should use extreme caution in crossing the pipeline, and only cross in areas where sufficient clearance exists. Boaters should strictly comply with the Inland Rules of the Road when transiting the dredging and pipeline area. Be advised that in some areas, it may not be possible to cross the pipeline due to the water depth, tide or pipeline characteristics.
