Contractors Working in our Neighborhood

In the past several weeks, I have received two vivid reports of contractor violations in our neighborhood while installing underground utilities. Specifically material left in the gutter— which flows down into the storm drains, and reports of illegal dumping in the storm drain system. Everyone should be aware that many utilities have current repair and installation activities in our neighborhood. If violations are noticed, the FIRST thing one should do is snap a photograph with any means you can. It is remarkable how quickly the response is to inappropriate contractor practices when confronted with a photo. Plus, reports to the city or state officials of contractor violations will be escalated for action if supported by a photo or two.

So please be aware of what is occurring in your surroundings and police our streets, gutters, and walkways for unprofessional practices. If suspicious, feel free to contact me and remember grab a photo, then ask questions. Thank you.

Water Saving Tip:

Check toilets for silent leaks. A leaking toilet can waste up to 200 gallons of water a day. Place several drops of food coloring in the toilet's tank, but don't flush. Wait 5 minutes and see if the color shows up in the toilet bowl. If the color moves from the tank to the bowl without flushing you have a silent leak. Repairs are usually very simple and parts inexpensive at all home supply stores.

Waterfront Living - Etiquette

As President of the Old Donation Creek Waterway Association, I have witnessed and heard from those living on the water about problem situations that can be avoided with a little planning. Most of us know that programs like Scoop the Poop, using "friendly" pesticides, and cleaning out our storm drains protects our water assets. Careful management of waterfront banks can be just as important to protecting our waterways. Here's a few ways you can help if you live on waterfront property:

- Yards with little or no vegetation will usually result in excess runoff deposits of soil and sedimentation filling in the river or lakes. Planting along the bank significantly protects against uncontrolled runoff.
- Bulkheads along lakes and rivers should be of sound construction. If leaks are detected in bulkheads the best method is to repair the problem versus just filling in sink holes which will only mask the problem and makes the underlining problem worse.
- Remember that storm bring extreme high tides, high winds and swollen lakes, these occurrences often displaces landscape material and lawn decorations into others property, so preplan by securing items as much as possible in anticipation of potential weather events.

Wondering what can be recycled in our Big Blue Recycle Cans?

- -Paper items: Clean newspaper, unwanted junk mail, school papers, catalogs, phonebooks, magazines
- -Cardboard: broken down and clean cardboard boxes
- -Chipboard: Such as cereal and cracker boxes, bottle holders
- -Plastic bottles with pouring necks, such as catsup, detergent bottles, etc. Clean out first (No motor oil bottles)
- -Metal containers: Aluminum, steel and tin cans, food containers, beverage cans. (discard lids and wash out)
- Glass containers: Clear, green, and brown glass. Remove lids and wash out first.


