Cell Phone Tower Proposal Approved

On Sunday, November 5, 2006 there was a special business meeting of the Pembroke Meadows/Shores Civic League. The meeting was held to discuss and vote on the leasing of property to T-Mobile for the construction of a mobile phone cell tower on Civic League property adjacent to the pool. After a presentation of the proposed contract and a question and answer session, the PMCL voted 51 to 3 to approve the contract, allowing T-Mobile to now present the construction plan to the City of Virginia Beach for the City's final approval. We will keep you informed on the progress of the cell phone tower. It is anticipated the cell phone tower will generate income to the civic league of at least \$1,200.00 per month. Speeding

Anyone who has spent five minutes driving on an American interstate highway knows two things: First, most other motorists seem to be in a mighty big hurry, and second, speed limits are generally ignored and poorly enforced. No small wonder that speed continues to play a major role in traffic deaths.

In 2004, for example, 13,192 fatalities (about a third of all deaths in traffic crashes) involved at least one driver who was speeding. Not surprisingly, about 40 percent of the speed-related fatal crashes occurred when the driver lost control on a curve. Speeding makes it much harder for a driver to steer around curves or to avoid objects in the road, extends the distance necessary to stop a vehicle, and increases the distance a vehicle travels while the driver reacts to dangerous situations.

Another major factor is the connection between speeding and driving after drinking. According to NHTSA data, 40 percent of drivers who were intoxicated (in other words, had a BAC of 0.08 or higher) were also speeding, compared to 15 percent for sober drivers. Also adding to the grim equation is the fact that speeders are less likely to be wearing seatbelts than drivers who go the speed limit, which dramatically increases their odds of being injured or killed. **Stay alive, BUCKLE UP and slow down to live!**



Energy Conservation Tip of the Month...



Install low-flow aerators on kitchen and bathroom sink fau-

cets to save water (and the energy used to to produce hot water). Aerators will typically cut water usage by as much as 280 gallons a month for a typical family of four.

How much can you put at the curb on trash day?

With all the falling leaves and limbs this time of year, here's a reminder of what yard debris the city will pickup curbside:

- Limbs up to 4 feet long and 6 inches in diameter, in a pile not to exceed 4x4x4 feet
- Up to 25 clear plastic bags of grass, leaves, and yard debris, not to exceed 25 pounds per bag
- Smaller yard debris such as grass and twigs may also be disposed of in your 90 gallon waster container.

Please remember, it is illegal to blow or rake your yard debris and leaves into the street. Please take advantage of our teens for hire listed in this newsletter if you need an extra hand!
