

DECEMBER 10<sup>TH</sup> 11:30 a.m. - 3 p.m.








#### **PET LOST & FOUND**

## PRESIDENTIAL PONDERINGS

The folks at the Ferry Plantation House have been generous with the neighborhood in providing a venue for our November wine and cheese gathering. The home is not only historic, but it provides a relaxing place to chat with neighbors. Hope to see lots of folks there.

On another, somewhat unpleasant note: in the past couple of months, I have gotten some complaints about door to door solicitors. The particular complaints were those who were selling magazines and books. What companies will do is "hire" (although they call them independent contractors) young men and women from all over the country, drop them off in a given neighborhood to hit for sales, then pick them up and go to the next neighborhood and do the same thing. The problem usually occurs months later when customers realize they never received the ordered subscription or are billed for more than they were led to believe they paid for.

Solicitors in Virginia Beach are required to obtain permits from the city. Before a permit is issued, a background check is conducted on the company to assure the company is legitimate. Each solicitor is required to have the permit in his possession when going door to door. You should ask to see that permit before parting with any of your money. If the person can't produce one, they are in violation of city ordinance. You could also run an internet search for complaints about the company the solicitor represents. The solicitors I dealt with were from Team Xtreme Sales and Millennium Sales; a check of customer reports was interesting reading. Usually, their sales pitch mentions that they are working toward a scholarship. The rep from Team Xtreme said he was in Virginia Tech's journalism school and was working on a documentary about the greatest generation; VT doesn't have a iournalism school.

There will be no December meeting, so I will take this opportunity to wish my fellow Pembroke Meadows dwellers a happy Thanksgiving and a Merry Christmas.

#### VIRGINIA BEACH SUSTAINABILITY PLAN

Virginia Beach is embarking on an exciting process to imagine what the City will be like in the year 2063 when Virginia Beach celebrates its 100th anniversary as a City. This vision of the future, though, is going to be filtered through a process of looking at policies and strategies to meet the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs and aspirations. The Sustainability Plan will focus on three major areas: environmental stewardship, economic vitality, and social responsibility. As it is developed with input from citizens, City staff and community stakeholders, the Plan will be organized around these three major areas.

To jumpstart the Plan process, the City's Environment and Sustainability Office will be hosting a series of public input meetings. These meetings will give a more complete overview of the process for developing the Plan, discuss what the City already has in place or underway as it relates to its policies, plans and vision, and then provide participants an opportunity to provide their suggestions on specific ideas or topics that they believe should be considered as the Plan is developed.

#### **Junk Median Signs**

You've seen them and tried to ignore them: small signs stuck in the median and around street corners advertising a variety of services. They add unsightly clutter to our neighborhood. What can you do? Pull them up and lay them on the ground. They are illegal as per Section 212, Virginia Beach Code of Ordinances. Temporary signs for yard and garage sales are acceptable, but should be removed when the event is over. Google "municode virginia beach city code" to see the full city code, then search for "section 212".

#### Live Oaks Delivered to Pembroke Meadows

- Friends of Live Oaks, a citizen advocacy group dedicated to preserving, protecting, and planting live oaks, has delivered 210 live oak trees to residents of Virginia Beach. Pembroke Meadows residents adopted 4 live oaks to plant in their yards. Many more were planted in nearby neighborhoods.

Many of the trees were rescued from property adjacent to Bayvista Condominium on Shore Drive when the land was cleared for construction in 2006. Pembroke Meadows resident Jeanette Willenbrink was one of the volunteers who rescued the trees from Shore Drive. She is an active member of Friends of Live Oaks and worked to make this distribution happen. The response was overwhelming and in order to fill all requests, 70 more live oaks were purchased from local growers to supplement the 140 rescued trees.

Trees were delivered to all areas of Virginia Beach from Pungo to Shore Drive, from the Oceanfront to Kempsville. It's obvious that the live oaks, the official tree of Virginia Beach, have special meaning to Virginia Beach residents. Their beauty symbolizes our coast. They provide shade and privacy for us and habitat for wildlife. They are drought-tolerant, disease-resistant, and low-maintenance. They resist salt spray, storm surges, even hurricanes. They increase property values and reduce air conditioning costs.

Pembroke Meadows is very, very lucky to have so many live oak trees. Protecting them from destruction will keep the neighborhood beautiful. While it's great to plant new live oaks, it takes hundreds of years for them to become the magnificent trees we love in Virginia Beach; preservation is essential.
