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
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On the Road Again

UTILITIES PHASE 1 AND 2 UPDATE

Phase 1 utility construction is completed. Paving is anticipated to begin by February and be completed by June 2024. There will be an overlap of paving in Phase 1 area north of Pembroke Blvd and construction of Phase 2 south of Pembroke Blvd.

Residents received notice from Virginia Paving Company that milling operations are to begin on January 9-12 on the following streets: St. Martin Drive, St. James Drive, St. James Circle, St. James Court, Temple Ct., St. Albans, and other areas of the Pembroke Shores side of the neighborhood. Following the completion of the milling and road prep, residents will be notified again when paving begins.

Phase 2 is under contract with Kevcor and will begin soon. They are in the process of creating the project schedule and having the materials approved. Notices should be delivered at least two weeks in advance of Kevcor beginning construction in the neighborhood. Staging should begin mid/late January. The first construction work should be at Bishop Dr (sewer work).

Real Estate Update

What Might 2024 Bring for Real Estate Sales?

Although 2023 saw 23.5% less real estate transactions than in 2022, home prices for most of the country held steady or increased. And most experts agree that the mortgage interest rates have already peaked. There is currently a pent-up desire for both buyers and sellers, and once the interest rate drops to around 6%, the prediction is that buyer and seller activity will increase dramatically.

Lawrence Yun, chief economist for the National Association of Realtors, along with other industry experts, are hopeful for a mortgage interest rate near 5.75 by the end of 2024. Most likely a midsummer rate drop will occur and we could see an end of summer housing sale surge.





Program: Active Shooter Attack Prevention and Preparedness

The training includes a facilitated discussion surrounding a short video depicting a staged active shooting and features examples of best practices related to planning, situational awareness, and survival mindset.

- 1. It's better to have a plan and not need it than to need a plan and not have it.
- 2. Situational awareness Be aware of what is going on around you.
- 3. Survival mindset What would you do to protect yourself or others?

Presenter is: Mike Freeman, Deputy Security Coordinator, Emergency Management, City of Virginia Beach

House Numbers Need to Be Displayed on House and be easily visible from the street. (below is the city code) Sec. 33-102. - Display of numbers generally.

- (a) It shall be the duty of the owner of each house or business building in the city to properly display, in or at the front thereof, in a position easily observed from the street, the proper number of his house or building, for the ascertainment of which he shall apply to the planning commission.
- (b) In addition to, but not in lieu of, the requirements of subsection (a) above, it shall be permissible to display the number of a house or building on the curb in front thereof. Any display of such number on the curb shall conform to the following standards:
 - (1) The numerals shall be in block form painted with black paint.
 - (2) The numerals shall be four (4) inches high and three-fourths (3/4) inches wide.
 - (3) There shall be no more than two (2) inches between numerals.
- (c) Any person who violates any provision of this section shall be guilty of a Class 4 misdemeanor, and each day that such violation continues after conviction thereof shall be deemed to constitute a separate offense. (Code 1965, § 32-55)

When our committee was driving around looking at the Christmas Decorations in the neighborhood it was brought to my attention that a great number of house numbers were not easy to read from the street.

Please go outside at night and look at your house from the street to see if this applies to your home. One of the most important reasons for this is that if emergency personnel are responding to a call at your home it could cost precious minutes for them to find your home and save a life. Please make sure your numbers are displayed in large block numbers that are easily identifiable and visible at night. Another good idea is to have the numbers painted on your curb as described above. If you have them on your curb, be sure to keep your gutters cleaned so that leaves do not cover the numbers.

Why are House Numbers Important?

Who would have thought that placing some numbers on your house or mailbox could save your life or the life of a loved one?

Those simple numbers placed on the exterior of your home can make the difference of life saving minutes in an emergency. Visible exterior numbers mean that first responders, Police/Fire/EMS, can find your house on the first pass without driving by. These minutes or even seconds saved could be the difference between life and death.

Just displaying exterior numbers is not enough. If we are going to do it let's do it right!

Placement:

- Make sure the numbers are visible from the roadway.
- If the house is too far from the road, post them on the mailbox or the curb. Address signs can also be placed on the edge of property.
- Make sure the numbers are not obstructed by tree limbs, bushes, or decorations.
- Make sure the numbers are in close proximity to a light so they are visible at night. If not a light, then use reflective numbers that can be seen at night.
- Color is important. Make sure the numbers are in sharp contrast to the background.
- Bass or bronze should be avoided as they are harder to read at night.

Design:

- Use Arabic numerals in an easy to read and bold font. Avoid numbers spelled out in word form.
- Display the numbers horizontally, not vertically, as they are easier to read.
- Numbers should be big and bold. The International Building Code recommends numbers be 4 inches in height and a minimum stroke width of 0.5 inches.

So get your house numbers out and display them boldly. It may just save your property, your life or the life of someone you love.



It's important to prepare your home from winter weather impacts from snow, ice, wind and cold. Nor'easters and coastal storms can be as impactful as hurricanes.

Residents can stay informed during local emergencies including major weather events by signing up for <u>VBAlert</u>. Text "VBAlert" to 67283 or sign up at <u>VirginiaBeach.gov/VBAlert</u> to receive important messages and emergency alert notifications from the City of Virginia Beach and Emergency Management during inclement weather.

Residents can also find valuable resources, tips and information on how to prepare before, during and after an emergency at <u>VirginiaBeach.gov/ReadvVB</u>.

Take Action

One of the first actions residents should take is winterizing their emergency supply kits for home, vehicle and work. Impacts from severe winter storms can isolate you and your family in your home for several days. Power outages can also affect your ability to heat your home.

Because of poor road conditions due to snow and ice—obtaining food, supplies and other necessities may be impossible. This is why it's important to have an emergency supply kit ready in your home, vehicle and work.

The emergency kit should contain supplies such as non-perishable food, medicines and baby items. Plan to have a supply to last at least three to five days. Some of these items may already be in your home from your hurricane kit.

In case of power outages during these colder months, consider having extra blankets and warm clothing to wear in layers if you are without heat for a few hours.

Never run a generator in an enclosed space. Make sure your carbon monoxide detector is working correctly and that the outside vent is clear of leaves and debris. During or after the storm, make sure it is cleared of snow. Home fires are common each winter when trying to stay warm.

Review ways to keep your home and loved ones safe in the event of a home fire.

Winter Emergency Kit

- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Battery-powered NOAA Weather Radio and portable radio to receive emergency information
- Extra food and water such as dried fruit, nuts, granola bars and other food requiring no cooking or refrigeration.
- Extra prescription medicine
- Baby items such as diapers and formula
- First-aid supplies
- Heating fuel: refuel before you are empty; fuel carriers may not reach you for days after a winter storm
- Emergency heat source: fireplace, wood stove or space heater properly ventilated to prevent a fire
- Fire extinguisher, smoke alarm; test smoke alarms monthly to ensure they work properly
- Extra pet food and warm shelter for pets

Winterize your emergency kits.

Stay Ahead. Stay Informed.

The National Weather Service winter outlook forecast for the 2023-24 season expects above normal temperatures this winter. Across Virginia, above normal precipitation totals are favored with Southeastern Virginia having the highest probability of receiving above normal precipitation, according to the National Weather Service.

Stay informed by knowing your winter weather season terminology.

Watches: Issued when a storm is in its early stage of development and may create conditions that harm life or property.

 Winter storm watch: Issued when heavy snow, dangerous ice accumulation or blizzard conditions are possible. Winter storm watches are typically issued 24-48 hours before a

- winter storm starts. Watches are issued when at least 3 inches of snow, and/or 1/4 inch or more of ice accumulation is expected in a 12-to-24-hour period.
- Wind chill watch: Issued when dangerously cold wind chills are possible typically in the next 12-48 hours.

Warnings: Issued when the threat of life and property is imminent or has already begun from severe winter weather.

- Winter storm warning: Issued when hazardous winter weather in the form of heavy snow, freezing rain, sleet or any combination is imminent or occurring. Winter storm warnings are typically issued 12-36 hours before the event is expected to start.
- Ice storm warning: Issued when dangerous ice accumulations are expected within the next 12-36 hours.
- Blizzard warning: Issued when sustained or gusty winds of 35 mph or more prevail, combined with falling or blowing snow, visibility of one quarter of a mile or less, and last for at least three hours.
- Snow squall warning: Issued for short duration intense bursts of snow and wind leading to whiteout visibility and possible flash freezes on roads.
- Wind chill warning: Issued when the combination of extreme cold and winds occur. This
 combination will result in frostbite, hypothermia, or even death when exposed in this type
 of condition for an extended period. These are issued when wind chill values are
 expected to be less than 15 degrees.

Advisories: Issued for less serious weather conditions that will not cause immediate threat to life and property. Advisories will be issued when weather conditions will impact motorists, outdoor activities, or public events.

- Winter weather advisory: Issued for accumulations of snow, lake effect snow, freezing rain, freezing drizzle, or sleet, that will create inconveniences. During an advisory, if caution is not exercised, life and property may be threatened. Snow of a coasting to less than 3 inches and any amount of ice accretion.
- Wind chill advisory: Issued when wind chill temperatures create inconvenience to life with prolonged exposure. If caution is not exercised, hypothermia and frostbite may occur. Issued for wind chill values less than 0 degrees but not colder than minus 14 degrees.
