BAYSIDE — "Progress through participation," the motto of the new Pembroke Meadows Civic League de-

started with a positive outlook.
Starting with 20 persons in the summer of 1967, it has grown to nearly 300 members.

Since its first official meeting in November 1968, the league has achieved goals at a whirlwind pace.

"Achievements and progress demonstrated by this league's accomplishments have far exceeded my own expectations," says C. C. Taylor, president. "It is clearly the result of a highly motivated and dedicated group of residents."

The most spectacular move

made by the league so far has been its project to build a re-creational center consisting of a pool, boat ramps, club house and tennis courts.

"It was a real pleasure to see the ground-breaking for our swimming pool," Taylor says.

Now under construction on a 3½ acre site at the Meadows, the 35-by-82-feet swimming pool is phase one of the proposed recreational center.

Built to complement the city's efforts to provide re-creational facilities for its residents, this project exemplifies the league's positive and cooperative ideals, Taylor says.

The pool completion date is planned for July 4.

Here are some more of the league's accomplishments:

Conducting a voter registration drive.

A special project is the or-ganization of a system of

"blocks" within the community, whereby all residents are divided into groups of 10 to 15 families with common interest

in their particular area.

These block committees, according to Taylor, have enabled the league to communi-cate freely with residents and in turn enabled residents to present their problems.

The league also publishes its own newspaper and has spe-cial membership guards similar in appearance to credit cards.

The organization's structure includes seven elected officers and a board of directors, which includes six additional officers.
